- Will you be mandated to give your cows access to outdoor areas to graze?
- Should you raise calves in individual pens without social contact?

Workshop Presenters



Dr. Nigel Cook, DVM is chair of the Department of Medical Sciences and a Professor in Food Animal Production Medicine at the University of Wisconsin-Madison School of Veterinary Medicine. Dr. Cook has spent over a decade examining the impact of environment on the wellbeing of dairy cattle. He manages Dairyland Initiative, the guide to welfare-friendly dairy cattle housing, an outreach program aimed at ensuring Wisconsin dairy producers build and remodel dairy cattle facilities with up-to-date approaches that safeguard wellbeing while optimizing productivity. In this role, Dr. Cook and other collaborators offer seminars, hands-on training and web resources to maximize cow comfort.



Dr. Franklyn Garry grew up on a dairy farm in upstate New York. He received his DVM from Cornell University and his MS from The Ohio State University. He worked in a dairy practice in New York, and in advanced clinical training at Ohio State and Munich, Germany's Maximilian University. Currently a professor at Colorado State University, Dr. Garry has been in the Department of Clinical Sciences since 1987 and the coordinator of the Integrated Livestock Management program since 1996. This graduate-studies program focuses on problems in cow/calf and feedlot operations as well as dairy agriculture.
